Meeting Minutes Westerlee Community Association, Inc. November 8, 2021

Present were officers John Fox (President), Wanda Richardson (Vice President), Fred Hickok (Secretary), Rizwan Mahmoodi (Treasurer), Klaus Philipsen (Past President) and board members Tanya Deshields, Chris Goatee, John Herron, Pam Jarrell and Jacqui Johnson. Board member Deborah Cason and was absent.

The meeting was called to order at 6:41 pm and the minutes of August 16, 2021, were approved.

Community Get-Together: John F. congratulated everyone on the very successful event. Pam commented that the 2-hour period was much better for people to see others. Jacqui remarked on the good choice of food boxes and the shortest ever cleanup time. 60 Box lunches were purchased and all were gone. John F. reported that 20 recycling bins were acquired by residents.

Dumpster Day: John F. said that the dumpster ended up a bit overloaded. He suggested having someone responsible for efficient loading and mentioned that Lorraine Marroulis arrived toward the end and took out a number of items to submit to a second-hand giveaway organization. He also praised the dumpster company and driver. John H. said that some residents had several loads for the rented truck to take to the dumpster. Klaus said we should limit it to one load per household but he also suggested putting an article in the newsletter with instructions on taking loads to the County's acceptance centers in Halethorpe and Cockeysville. He moved that John H. be reimbursed for the truck rental and to pay his assistant and the motion was approved. Klaus reported that the County may be going to free bulk trash collections from residences once or twice a year or more frequent bulk pickups for small fees. He also suggested an article appear in the newsletter strongly urging recycling.

Holiday Light Competition: Chris suggested sending pictures to board members and having them vote while Klaus suggested having residents make nominations on the Westerlee website and then having residents vote between December15th and 30th. Pam said she doesn't know how to do that. Klaus said he would take care of it. There was discussion about using Facebook, Nextdoor and our website to engage residents more. Pam will be putting an ad in the newsletter for a volunteer to manage the website.

Swale: John H. described new construction in the swale behind some Fernglen properties. Klaus said that years ago Westerlee deeded the swale to the County to be kept as natural open space. He added that the current residents responsible for the recent incursion are uncooperative for maintaining the open space. John H. said that he asked the BGE arborists to pile the cuttings along the sides of the swale. Rizwan noted that the water runoff behind his property is not so strong now.

Security Square Mall Redevelopment: Klaus reported that the Baltimore County NAACP has strongly lobbied for a mixed-use development that would combine shopping, housing and open spaces and it is now up to the County authorities to make decisions.

Sympathy: Klaus reported that a neighboring wife and husband pair died recently within a short time period of each other. Wanda said that she would send a condolence card to their family.

Newsletter: Pam announced a November 15th deadline for submissions so that the newsletter will go out around Thanksgiving.

Treasurer: Rizwan remarked that we should decide how to use a good portion of the approximately \$18,600 balance or perhaps reduce the annual fees. He noted the proposal of planting small trees in the roadside spaces. Klaus said that another project that could be costly is the nature path up from Cedar Circle Drive. He also warned about having too small a balance because of the possibility of needing to cover unforeseen legal fees.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:09 pm.

December 13, 14 - Geminids Meteor Shower. The Geminids is the king of the meteor showers producing up to 120 multicolored so-called shooting stars streaking in the sky in an hour at its peak. They are produced by rocky debris trailing an asteroid known as 3200 Phaethon, which was discovered in 1982. It peaks this year on the night of the 13th and morning of the 14th. The waxing gibbous moon will block out most of the fainter meteors this year but brighter ones are so numerous and bright that this could still be a good show. Best viewing will be from a dark location after midnight. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Gemini, but can appear anywhere in the sky.

December 19 - Full Moon. This was known by early Native American tribes as the Cold Moon because this is the time of year when the cold winter air settles in and the nights become long and dark. It has also been known as the Long Nights Moon and the Moon Before Yule.

January 3, 4 - Quadrantids Meteor Shower. The Quadrantids is an above average shower, with up to 40 meteors per hour at its peak. It is thought to be produced by dust grains left behind by an extinct comet known as 2003 EH1, which was discovered in 2003. The thin, crescent moon will set early in the evening leaving dark skies for what should be an excellent show. Meteors will radiate from the constellation Bootes.

January 7 - Mercury at Greatest Eastern Elongation. Mercury will be 19.2 degrees from the Sun in the western sky just after sunset.

January 17 - Full Moon. This was known as the Wolf Moon because this was the time of year when hungry wolf packs howled outside camps. It has also been known as the Old Moon and the Moon After Yule.

February 16 - Full Moon. This was known as the Snow Moon because the heaviest snows usually fell during this time of the year. It has also been known as the Hunger Moon, since the harsh weather made hunting difficult.

March 18 - Full Moon. This was known as the Worm Moon because this was the time of year when the ground would begin to soften and the earthworms would reappear. It has also been known as the Crow Moon, the Crust Moon, the Sap Moon, and the Lenten Moon.
